Online fraud is the use of Internet services to take advantage of other people by stealing personal information, which can even lead to identity theft. Internet services can be used to present fraudulent solicitations to prospective victims, to conduct fraudulent transactions, or to transmit the proceeds of fraud to financial institutions or to others connected with the scheme. Online scams can happen through social engineering and social influence. It can occur in chat rooms, social media, email, message boards, or on websites.
